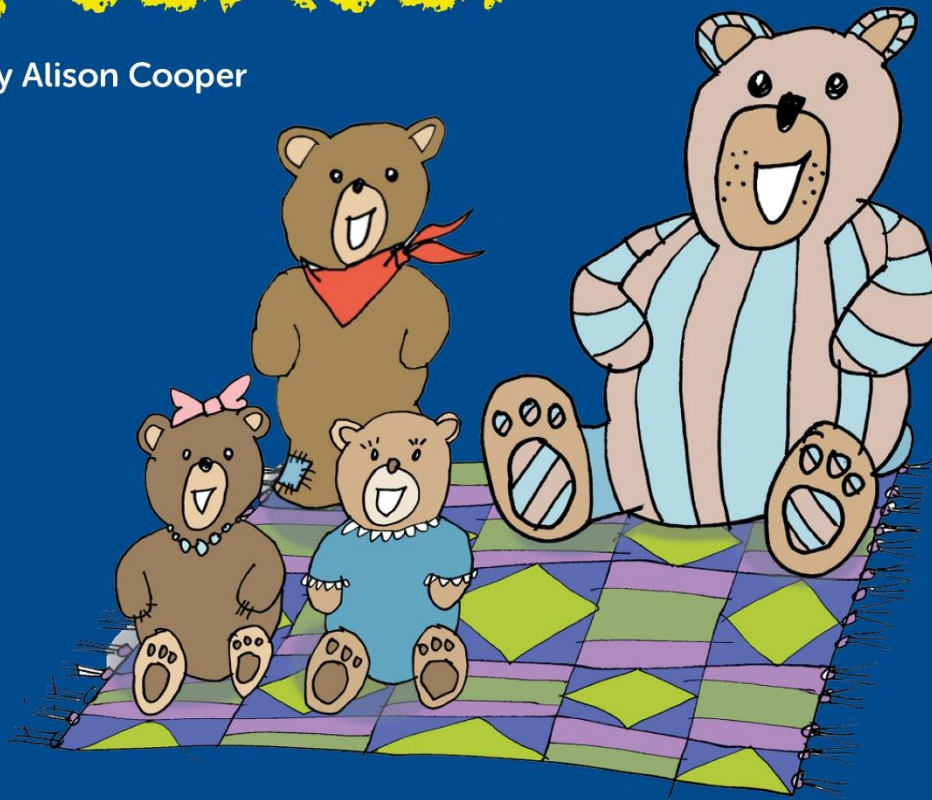

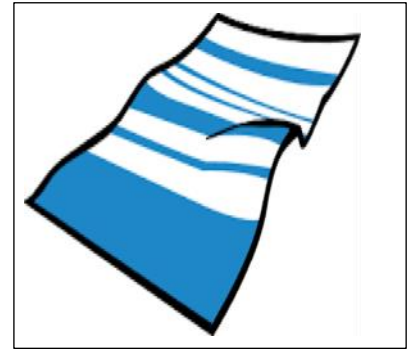
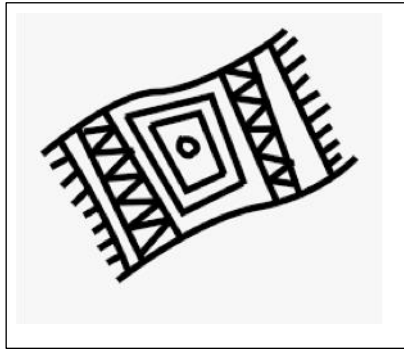

Brian's recipe for two teddy bear toasts

What you need:

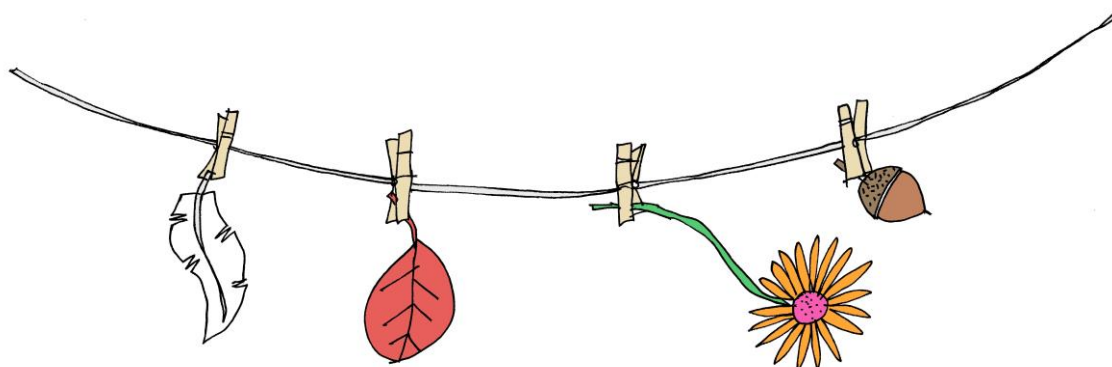
- 2 slices wholemeal or white bread
- 2 tablespoons of peanut butter (you can replace this with chocolate spread in case of nut allergies)
- 6 banana slices
- 6 raisins

What you do:

1. Toast the bread.
2. Spread with peanut butter.
3. Add banana slices for the ears and nose.
4. Place the raisins on each slice of banana for the eyes and in the centre of the banana nose.
5. Now tuck in!

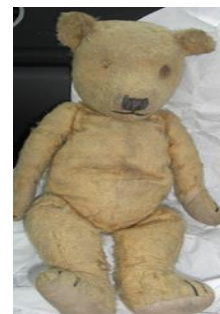

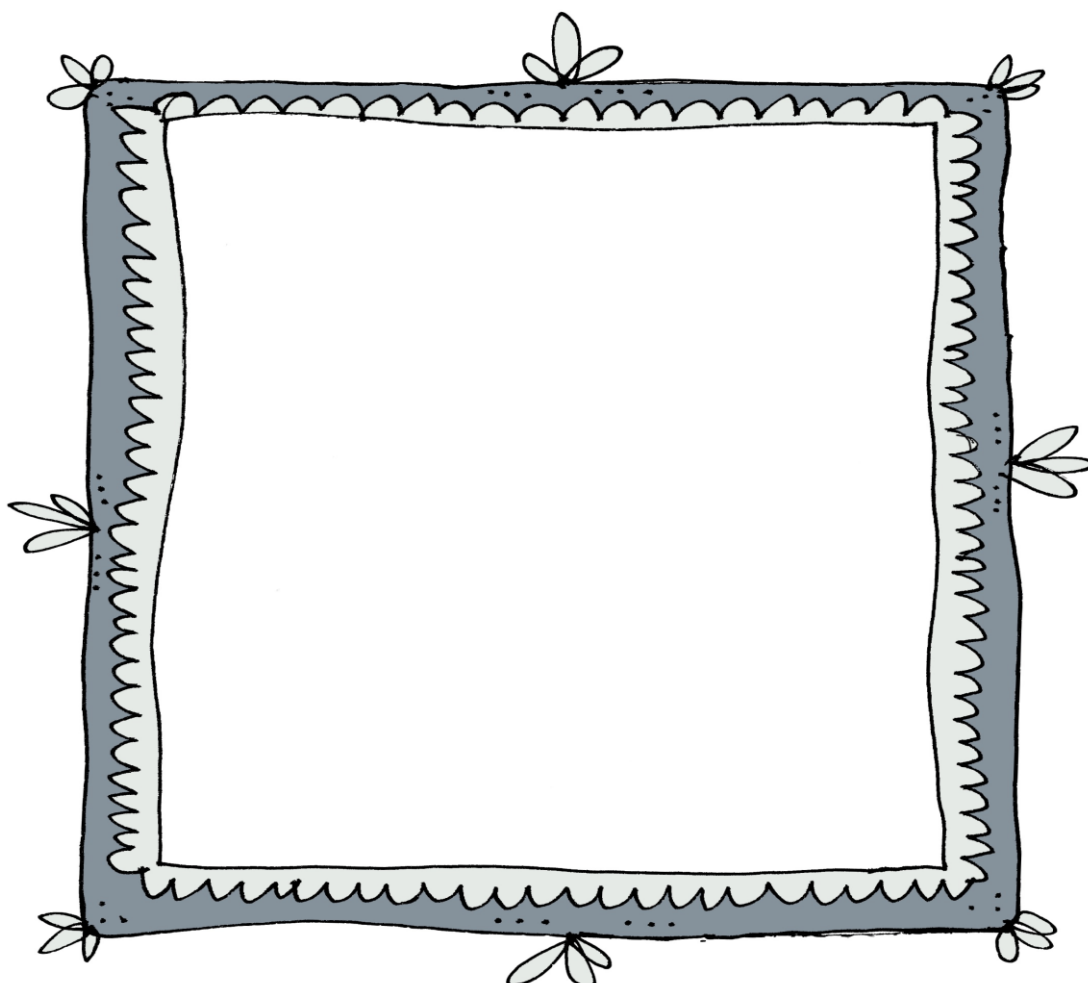

Drawing a teddy bear

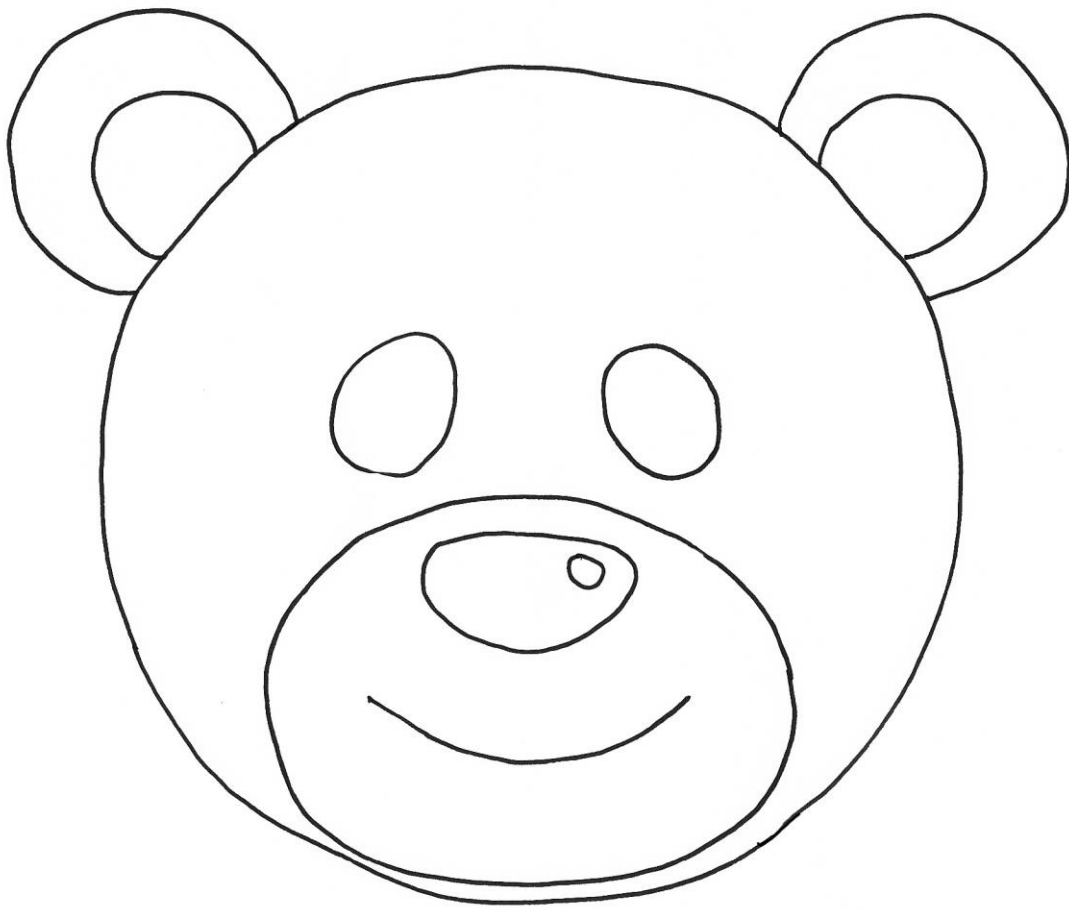
